LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

St. Joseph Public Library has enjoyed a good year. For the first time in several years substantial improvements were made to the building.

The new street entrance to the Children's Library was completed in July. It provides safe and easy access to the ground-floor library. Glaze Construction Company did the work from plans by Brunner and Brunner. Not only is it an attractive addition to the building but we believe it has been a factor in the increased use of the Children's Department.

What was formerly an old storage area was remodeled into a modern staff dining room and kitchen. This provides a place for the twenty three staff members at Central Public Library to eat lunch and dinner. It is especially

appreciated by those who are on duty until 9:00 p.m.

With seating for 26, this room has provided a place for extension college courses in Library Science given by Northwest Missouri State University. Professor James Johnson has given two courses in the past year with enrollments of 26 and 29 each. These courses will continue for the full 10 hours needed to enter graduate library school or to partially fulfill the requirements for school librarians. Nine of the St. Joseph Public Library staff are enrolled.

The Library as Information Center

Most significant of the year's activities is the increasing use of the Reference Department by the entire community.

32,243 questions were recorded, a 12% gain over last year, and the highest

number on record.

Business firms, club members, local history and geneology researchers make heavy use of our resources.

The hot line to the State Library, Jefferson City, is frequently used

by citizens to check on the progress of bills in the Legislature.

The Congressional Quarterly weekly report provides a similar service to those interested in the status of bills in Congress.

Moody's Investors Services are a welcome aid to investors.

A low cost photocopying service makes it possible to take home needed information instead of the whole book in which it appears. 381 periodicals are cared for in the Reference Department from check in date until they are bound or microfilmed for future use.

A Depository Library since 1907, our government publications now number 53,206. Doris Finley, Head of Reference, and Elizabeth Broom, Assistant Reference Librarian, attended a two-day study session on the care and use of this important information. We receive between three and four thousand pieces each year. The Reference staff also gives orientation days for eighth grade classes. Research is made easier for the students by these "get acquainted" projects.

Circulation Services

St. Joseph Library system loaned 372,583 books and library materials, a not insignificant figure. Of this amount, 272 were inter-library loans. For the second year, adults have borrowed more books than children, reversing the trend of many years; 53% were loaned to adults, 47% to children.

Although 13,652 children attended library programs and activities, the developing elementary school libraries furnish most curriculum related reading.

Adult circulation remained stable in the branch libraries and bookmobile. The circulation averaged 5.1 books per capita. At Central Public there was a 4% decrease. This with the 12% increase in reference requests may point to a greater need by the public for information than for recreational reading.

Two reasons for this cited by urban libraries are first, the inexpensive paperbacks available everywhere and second, the fear many women have, whether justified or not, of going to the library or bookmobile in the evening.

Washington Park Library

Over one thousand children each month attend programs or class visits at Washington Park Branch Library. The tireless and imaginative librarian, Alyce Hougas and her assistant, Pat Fuson, have given the library a meaningful place in the north side community.

A book station at Memorial Home for the Aged is a source of great enjoy-

ment for residents there.

Head Start classes and the Deaf Children's Class from Humboldt are given identical story hours and film programs as those given for our patrons twice weekly at Washington Park.

Carnegie Branch Library

Carnegie has a smaller but equally loyal public. Mothers bring children to the library activities, have coffee and select their books while the children attend story hour.

Wesley Day Care Center South and Head Start classes are given the same programs on succeeding days. More students use the reference room at Carnegie

than at Washington Park.

In addition to the two regular story hours a week at Central the same programs are repeated for Wesley Day Care East, Head Start, Children's Rehabilitation Unit, Cerebral Palsy School and the Davis School for Trainable Children. This service to the disadvantaged was initiated by the children's librarians who believe that a love of good reading can be a help and perhaps a solace to these children later in life.

The Bookmobile

The Bookmobile makes 31 stops in residential neighborhoods and 6 suburban

schools every two weeks.

To serve the elderly and shut-ins, books are taken to the Pavilion of Missouri Methodist Medical Center and to a nursing home. The Bookmobile has stops at Northwood, 1402 Maxwell, East Side Apartments and Oak Ridge Apartments, 12th and Angelique, where many retired people live.

Stops which serve citizens in the annexed area are Northridge; 40th and Duncan; Blair School, 34th and Renick; Spring Garden, 5802 South 22nd Street; Skaith, 4701 Schoolside Lane; Pickett School, 3923 Pickett Road; Pershing School, 2610 Blackwell Road; East Lantern Lane and East Hills Shopping Center.

Book Stations

Collections of paperback books of interest to teen age readers were placed this year in the Education Center of Black Citizens for Progress, 2001 Messanie Street and in the Transitional Home for Girls, 312 North 20th Street.

Constance F. Runcie Memorial Collection of Art

The Runcie Club contributed \$400.00 this year to the Constance F. Runcie Memorial Collection of Framed Art. There are 269 prints in the adult collection at Central Library. Small collections of these are placed in the branch libraries for circulation. They are loaned for eight weeks. The memorial was established ten years ago and has been sustained with annual gifts.

The Runcie Gallery of Art for Children was established last year in Central's Children's Department with a gift of \$800.00. The club made a

\$500.00 contribution this year.

We opened with 39 framed prints; 20 more were purchased this year. The gift also allowed us to purchase the Britannica Audio Museum Collection. Twelve books, each on the work of a great artist is accompanied by comments on cassettes by docents on the staffs of National Gallery of Art and the Chicago Art Institute. Art appreciation round-tables for the older child have been organized at the three libraries.

Phonograph Record Collection

The St. Joseph Altrusa Club contributed \$280.00 this year in support of the Altrusa Memorial Record Collection. These loyal friends have made an annual sustaining gift for 19 years. There are 2,062 albums.

Films

As a member of the Missouri Libraries Film Cooperative the library receives 15 films a month. We loaned 1,190 films which were viewed by 52,841 persons. Churches, clubs, schools, the YMCA, Salvation Army, State Hospital #2 and Albrecht Gallery are regular patrons.

Book Collection

Many libraries buy books as demand dictates but our aim is to keep our subject collections current and despite space problems we have kept the standard works of literature and history our discriminating predecessors

acquired for this library.

Students are always interested in Samuel Johnson's Dictionary 8th ed. 1799 and a Missouri item, "Journal of the Senate of the Rebel Legislature" held at Neosho, Missouri, 1861. We have hundreds of important older books now being sold in reprinted editions. This year 8,694 books were purchased; 6,044 new titles; 2,650 added titles or replacements. Discarding old and out of date material is also important. 5,929 volumes were withdrawn.

Personnel

This past year Pat Mc Cartney, Head of Circulation, resigned to become Coordinator of Elementary School Libraries in St. Joseph.

Carolyn Weston of the Circulation Department is leaving to become Central

High School Librarian.

Both of these librarians had been with us since high school days when they were pages. Both are knowledgable and popular.

We have a conscientious and helpful staff. It is our hope that the standard of pay can be made more competitive. Our service is diminished by constant turnover.

An example of a good librarian is Ann Covington, Head of Children's Services, at Central Public. Her enthusiasm and fresh ideas increased library use 33% from September, when she was appointed, to April 30, the end of our year.
