LIBRARIAN'S REPORT 1973 - 1974

1973 - 1974 was a year of progress and growth for St. Joseph Public Library. Two new services were added, the film collection expanded and the Library Board has undertaken a program of interior improvements at Central Library.

New services include Books by Mail for the homebound and membership in the Missouri Libraries Cassette Cooperative.

Books By Mail was established in October 1973. An illustrated catalog written by the library staff was furnished free to make selection easier for the homebound. Books are mailed postpaid at the library book rate, six cents a pound. They are sent in reusable bags with a return label enclosed. Many books are returned by friends of the borrowers. This service means a great deal to a growing number of house bound people. The response has been good. This is a feasible way of ensuring library service to all in the community.

By membership in the Missouri Libraries Cassette Cooperative, cassettes of educational worth can be obtained by the library at a small fraction of the list price with duplication rights. The library will keep the master on file and duplicates will be made on low cost blank tapes for home use.

Film Service

St. Joseph Public Library has been a member of the Missouri Libraries Film Cooperative for twenty years. This year, due to the uncertainties of federal funding, the member libraries were assessed according to population which raised the annual fee but will insure the existance of the organization. As a result of the increased membership fee our library will receive 45 films a month instead of fifteen. We have on loan fifteen Canadian films, a gift of the Canadian government, so the selection for the many clubs, study groups, churches and institutions who use the films will be greatly improved. This year our films were seen by 53,716 persons.

Framed Art

The Runcie Club of St. Joseph made a \$3,000 gift to the library in 1963 to establish a framed art collection to loan for home enjoyment. Information about the painter and his work is found on the reverse of each picture. As a form of adult education this has been a popular service.

Each year the Runcie Club makes an additional gift of money to support the Constance Fauntleroy Runcie Memorial and the Runcie Gallery of Art for Children. At present there are 294 framed prints for adults, 78 for children.

With such a good selection of non-book materials we are hoping to combine these services with the Altrusa Memorial Phonograph Record Collection into an audio-visual department under one head.

Building Improvements

The Library Board is continuing a program of improvements started last year with the opening of a new front entrance to the Children's Library at street level, and the modernization of the staff dining room.

The librarian's office and the three public rooms on the west side of the building; Toothaker, Eugene Field and the main Reference Room have been painted and carpeting has been purchased.

New lighting was planned by engineers from the Light and Power Company for the lobby, the librarian's office, the Toothaker, Eugene Field and the main children's room.

The art glass dome in the lobby will again be visible which will please old timers and local history enthusiasts. This is the first rehabilitation project of any size at Central Library since 1954.

Library Science Classes

Northwest Missouri State University continued to offer extension courses in library science in the Central Library Staff Room.

Attendance has averaged twenty-five. From five to nine of our staff have been enrolled. By the end of the summer some will have acquired a minor in library science.

These courses are not available at Missouri Western College.

Circulation

Total circulation this year is 377,578, a gain over last year's 372,311. This is heartening considering the difficulty patrons encounter driving downtown into the changing traffic patterns and closed streets due to urban renewal.

An analysis of the circulation figure show substantial increases in the number of adult books loaned by the bookmobile and Washington Park Branch library. There was a small decrease in adult circulation at Central library.

Circulation Control

For the second year the City Legal Department has assisted the library in recovering library books and materials we had almost despaired of retrieving from delinquent borrowers. Our thanks is due to Mr. Ron Taylor and his staff.

Children's Services

The increase in circulation at Central Library was largely due to the attractive and innovative programs planned by Ann Covington, Children's Librarian. 14,595 children attended programs and activities over the system.

Central Library and the two branch libraries are situated near or in city parks. Children enjoy them each year for class picnics, Easter Egg Hunts, Halloween parades and Boy and Girl Scout troops who meet at the branch libraries. This Spring one group picked up the litter in Carnegie Park.

Story and film programs are given at the libraries from October to May. Class visits are a regular feature at Washington Park which is located near two public schools, Humboldt and Lindbergh.

Special story hours are given for Head Start classes at all libraries. At Central, programs are given on a regular basis for the Cerebral Palsy School, the Children's Rehabilitation Unit and the Helen Davis School for the Trainable. Films are shown at Washington Park to the Deaf Children's Class.

The grade school child has many attractions competing for his time on Saturday. Our Saturday programs include a 90 minute feature film once a month. Most appealing have been the programs presented by talented St. Joseph persons. Appearing this year were a magician, a Karate expert and Richard Nolf, St. Joseph Museum director who brought two large but harmless snakes and spoke on "Reptiles of Missouri". Movies of the Kansas City Chiefs and Royals were also big attractions.

A poster collection established this year has grown to 150.

The Runcie Gallery of Art for Children is widely used. There are 78 to choose from.

A circulation gain of 6,116 over last year was recorded at Central. Total children's circulation at Central was 58,634. System wide the children borrowed 177,041 books.

Reference and Information Services

Reference librarians are met with an endless variety of questions by telephone, through the mail and person to person at the reference desks.

This year was a busy one. 34,057 requests for information were recorded. A third librarian was necessary to keep abreast of the work.

The legislative "hot line", new last year, was used heavily once the public discovered how quickly the State Library furnished information on the work of the State Legislature.

Questions concerning local history and geneology increase each year. Visitors from almost every state in the union come during vacation months because of St. Joseph's place in the history of the trek westward.

A government depository library since 1907, we received 2,500 publications this year from the Government Printing Office. We have a collection of 55,706 on file.

In daily use are the 287 city and telephone directories.

Bookmobile

The bookmobile makes 32 stops in residential neighborhoods every two weeks. New stops added this year were Miller Road and Flintstone and Safari Drive and Arrowhead.

Ten stops in the easternmost section of the city reach people who live the greatest distance from downtown.

New books on date of publication are available on the bookmobile as well as at Central Library.

The bookmobile librarian, Gale Logan, leaves a collection of books at the Methodist Medical Center Pavilion for the elderly residents.

Book Collection

Books in the system total 172,570. Looking back ten years when the librarian took this office, our holdings numbered 146,238. It is gratifying to see the year to year increases in the book budget. This year 8,711 books were added.

From four to seven thousand books wear out or become out dated and must be discarded each year.

The staff assists the librarian in book selection. Juvenile books are discussed and selected by children's librarians. Adult books are chosen by the librarian and the department heads.

We receive ten book review magazines to make the selection a more informed one.

Personnel

It is with great regret that we accepted the resignation of Janis Euler who has been on the reference staff. She will become Lafayette High School librarian in August.

Ann Covington, our fine children's librarian, has announced her plans to go back to the university to work for a degree.

Two staff members, Margie Hainline and Judi Cunning, are also returning to college in the Fall.

It has been both stimulating and enjoyable to work with the library staff this year. Many ideas and successful projects originated with the younger staff members. Their interest in library work was shown by their attendance at library science classes and their present plans to attain post graduate degrees.
