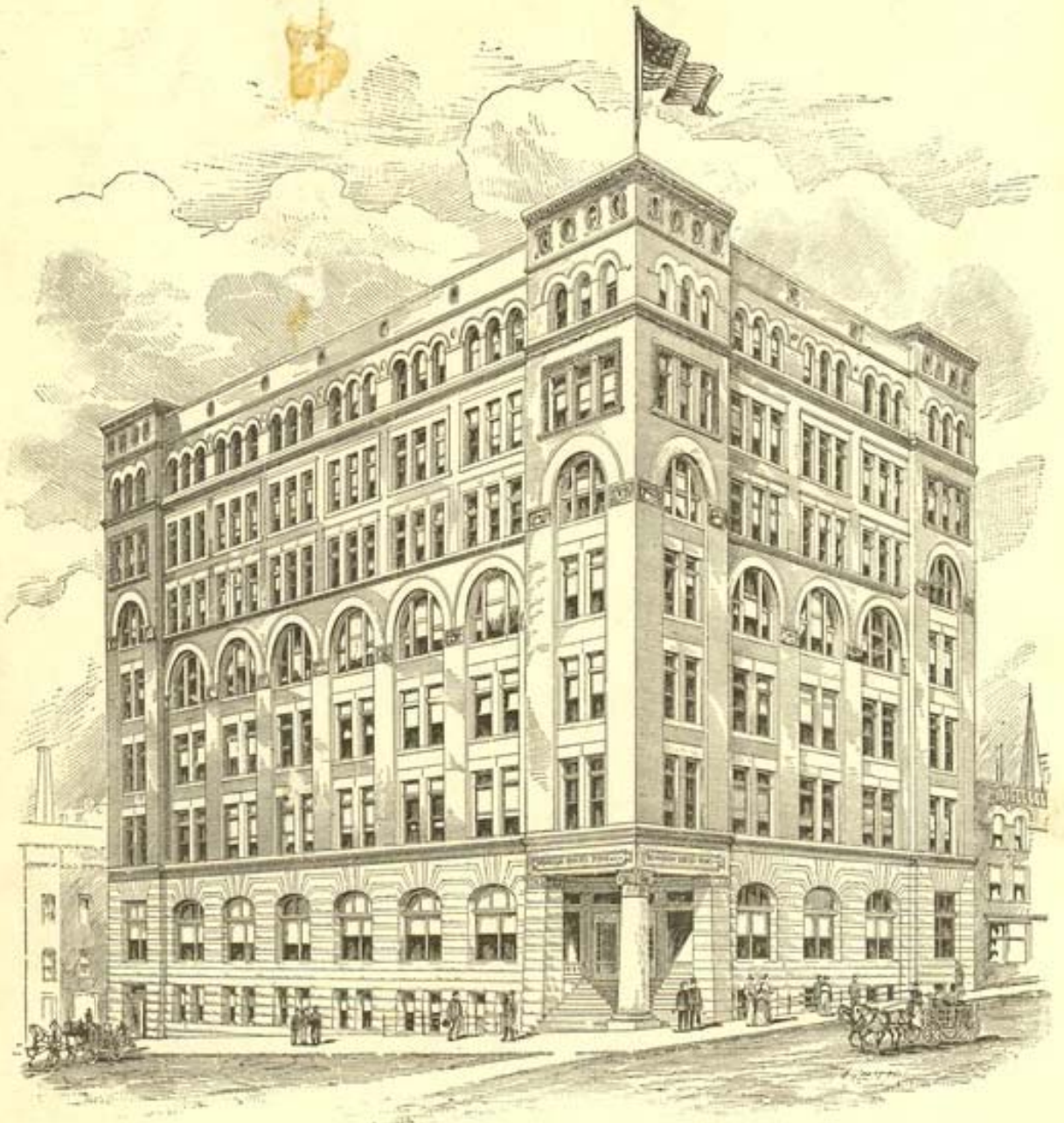

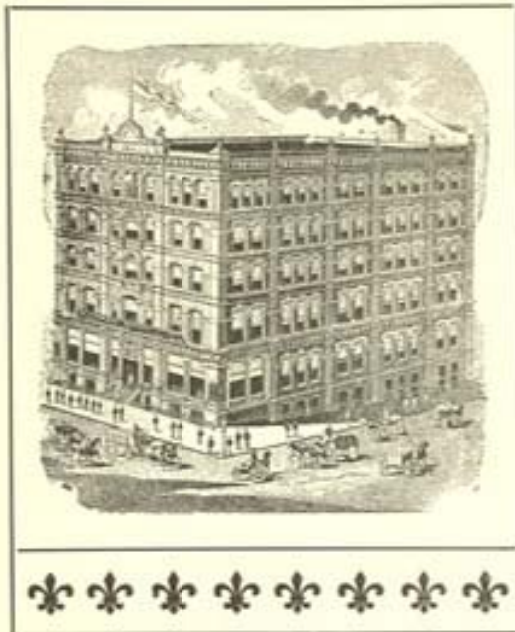

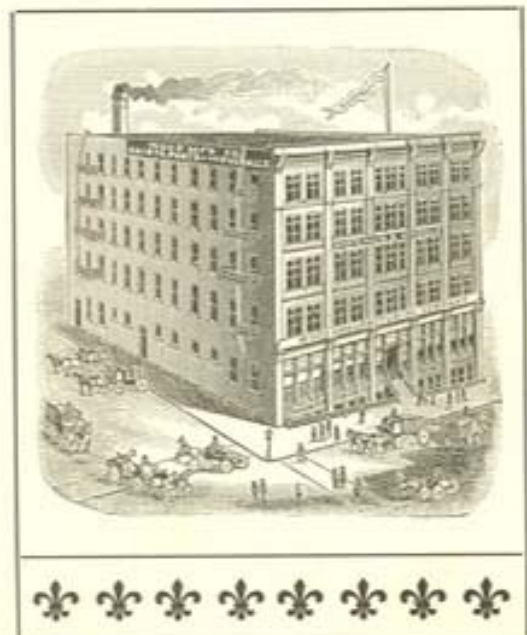

INTRODUCTION



A succinct history of the St. Joseph Fire Department from the inception of the first Volunteer Brigade to September 1st, 1900, is contained in this book. In presenting it a word should be said of the brave, but modest, men who protect our homes from devastation and ruin, and who are as indispensable to us as the guardians of the peace or the doctor who brings us back to health from the verge of the grave.

Always on duty, when the sun rides the cerulean sky at midday or at that solemn hour when churchyards yawn. When rain and tempest sweep the streets and weirdly shriek around the gables, beneath which citizens are wrapped in tranquil slumber, the firemen are called from their beds hurriedly and in the twinkling of an eye are dashing through the deserted highways to save property from the unbidden destroyer. This is the life of the fireman, day in and day out, and true appreciation is given to him only when the thinking man pauses to listen to the startling clang of the alarm bell or to look upon the tall columns of smoke sweeping toward the sky above a burning building. At other times the fireman, to the casual observer, is an idle-seeming fellow. We do not remember that our lives and property are in his keeping by day and by night, and, that on his coolness, his strength and his courage depends everything, and that while he is apparently idling the happy hours away he is merely waiting the call that requires him to take his life anew in his hands and hasten where danger waits. To him we owe much and our measure of thanks cannot be too full.

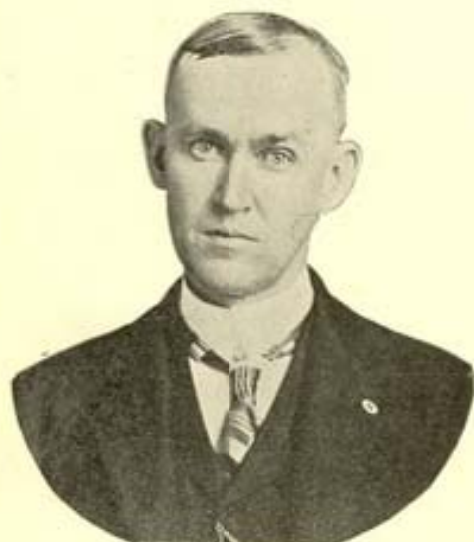

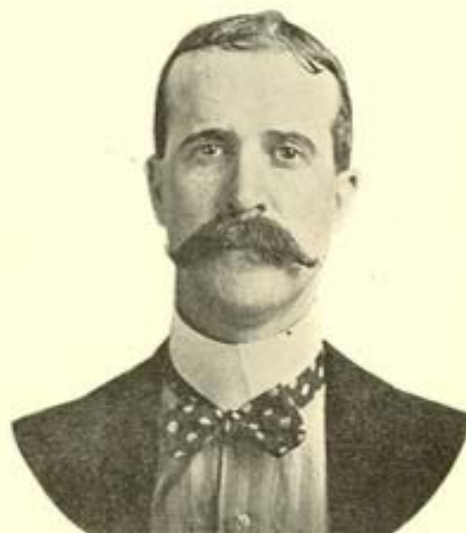

THE PRESENT EQUIPMENT.

Since the organization of a paid fire department in St. Joseph in 1867, this branch of the public service has been steadily on the increase. In 1872, when W. B. McNutt was appointed chief, extra efforts were made to gain public sentiment in favor of a good fire department, and very little trouble has been experienced since. The property owners of this city have been placed under many obligations to the firemen, and if there have been occasions when their houses have been destroyed through inefficiency of the apparatus it has only given them greater incentive to add to the department the necessary paraphernalia until it has reached its present wonderful degree of efficiency.

It is not saying too much to state that very few cities in the country of the size of St. Joseph, or larger, can show such a small fire loss. Alarms are numerous, as the records will show, and the men are kept on the go pretty steadily, but the total of losses is comparatively insignificant. This city is as

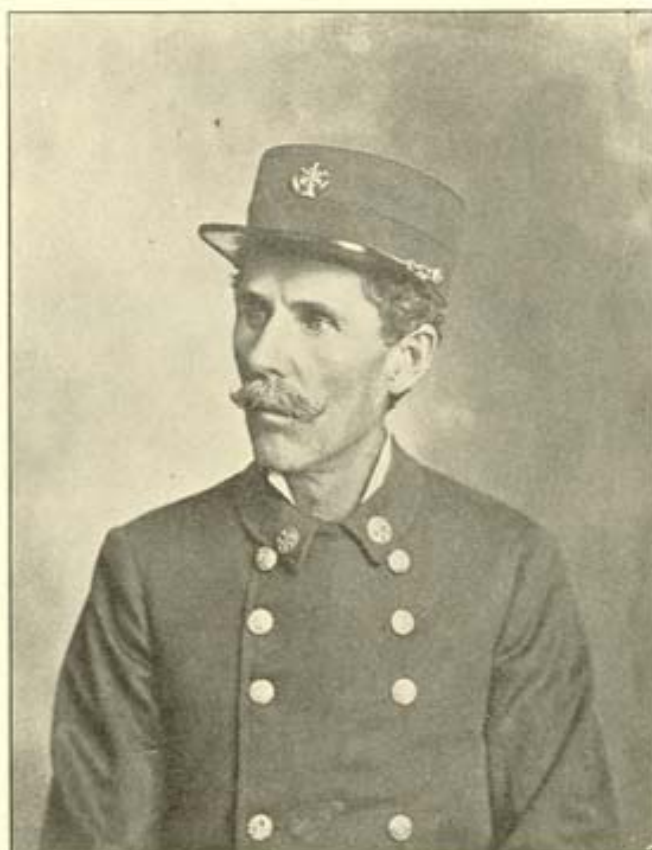

vulnerable as others, but the fact that the latest improved methods and machinery are in use and that the men are among the most efficient of their calling in the country, is the secret that saves money for the insurance companies and time for the business men who would otherwise spend a greater or less portion of each year in waiting for the erection of new buildings.

From the small beginning of thirty years ago the fire department has grown with the city to an institution of modern proportions. There are at the present time fifty-five men in the department, and the equipment in use consists of the following:

Four two-horse reels.

Five hose wagons.

Two combination hose and chemical wagons, the latest out.

One aerial hook and ladder company.

One water tower, fifty-five feet high.

All the hose wagons have ladders, and are thereby capable of rendering much better service.

The department has 14,500 feet of hose, all nearly new and of the very best.

Thirty-two horses are used in the department, including the extras. The reserve horses are quartered at the hose house, Ninth Street and Doniphan Avenue, where six or eight horses are kept in reserve continually, and where the disabled animals are sent for treatment. Here also are kept the supplies of the department—two double reels, a supply wagon, extra hose, etc. Chief Kane, who personally supervises the supplies of the department, each autumn purchases feed sufficient for a year's use and keeps it stored at this point, whence it is issued as demanded to the various houses of the city.

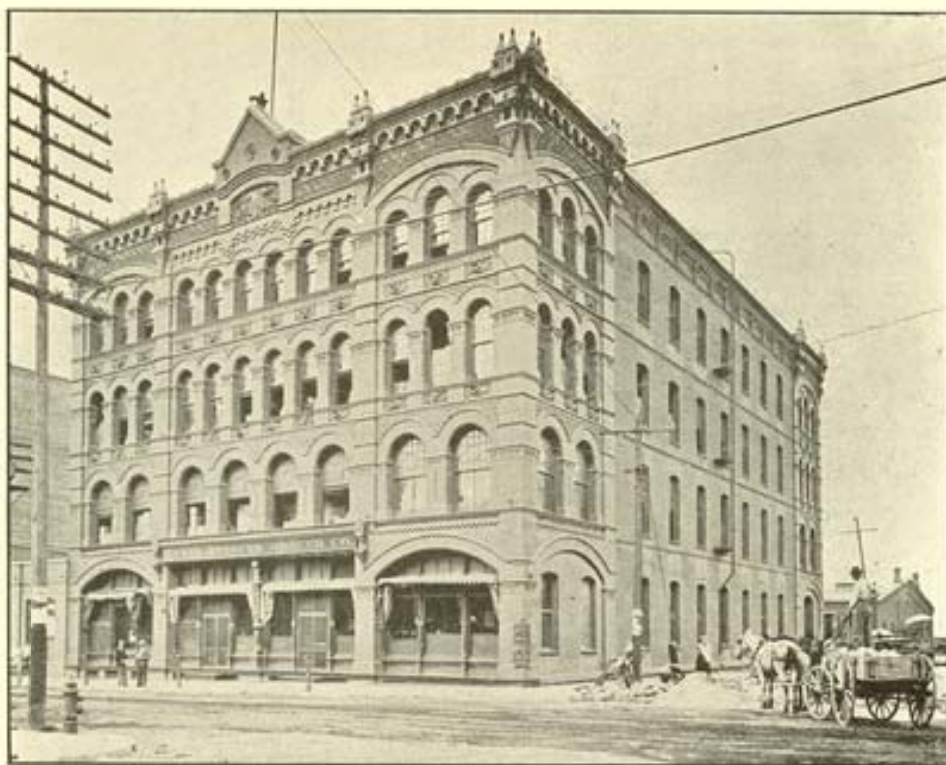
LOCATION OF HOUSES AND FIREMEN.

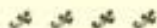

acting in conjunction with the chief. In addition to the fifty-nine regular men of whom the department is composed, there are two substitutes who find constant employment subbing for the regulars, who are allowed nine days' vacation annually.

P. P. Kane is chief of the fire department. His headquarters are at Seventh and Charles Streets. J. O. Knapp is assistant chief, headquarters at Fire Hall No. 1.

Money has been appropriated by the city for the purchase of a lot and erection of building in South St. Joseph, and by December 1, a hose house large enough for the accommodation of two companies will be erected in that rapidly growing suburb. The stockyards and large packing houses are located in this section of the city, and are just outside of the city limits and good fire protection there is considered of vast importance.

The department also owns two lots in the city—one at Fourth and Jackson Streets, the other at Third and Dolman, where fire houses will be erected in the near future.

THE BIGGEST FIRES.

It has been said that the city has been remarkably exempt from destructive fires. Since 1890, inclusive, there have not been to exceed a dozen. The greatest of these occurred in the forenoon of

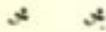
ALARMS AND CAUSES OF FIRES.

During 1899 the department answered 278 alarms. Of these eleven were false alarms, three due to automatic sprinklers getting out of order, and escaping steam and smoke were responsible for eight runs. Burning flues caused forty-nine alarms. The fires were due to the following causes :

EXPENSES OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The report of Fire Chief Kane for the fiscal year ending April 17, 1900, shows the total expenditures for the department to have been \$48,385.64, of which \$44,519.33 was for salaries, and \$4,866.31 for new hose and other expenses. The appropriations for that year were \$46,000 for salaries and \$6,000 for expense, leaving a balance unexpended of \$2,614.36.

THE VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANIES.

The "bucket brigade" which was the city's only protection against fire in the early days gave way in 1865 to volunteer fire companies, equipped with a steam fire engine, ladder truck and hose reel. To Gen. W. R. Penick, mayor of the city from 1864 to 1866, belongs the credit of securing the purchase of apparatus and the organization of fire companies. In his message to the city council, upon entering upon his office, Mayor Penick recommended the appropriation of \$5,000 for the purchase of a steam fire engine, and in August of that year the appropriation was made. Mayor Penick then urged the necessity of additional apparatus and organized fire companies, and sufficient means for the purchase of a hose reel and a ladder truck was subscribed by the citizens.

In May, 1865, the apparatus arrived, and the Blacksnake Engine Company and the Rescue Hook-and-ladder Company were formed. Horses were provided to draw the steam engine, the other apparatus being drawn by hand. In 1866 the German-Americans organized a fire company, and purchased a hand engine. A supply of water for fire fighting purposes was insured by the construction of thirteen cisterns at important points in the business district.

The paid fire department was established in 1870. It consisted then of seven men, who were

stationed in a house at the foot of Edmond street. The apparatus consisted of the steam engine and three one-horse hose reels. The Rescue Volunteer Hook-and-ladder Company remained in service, and in 1871 was re-enforced by two paid men and two horses. Interest in the volunteer companies waned, however, with the introduction of the paid men, and the volunteer companies soon disbanded.



THE FIREMEN'S RELIEF ASSOCIATION.

The Firemen's Relief Fund Association having charge of a fund for the pensioning of disabled and superannuated firemen, and for the relief of the widows and children of firemen who may be killed or die in the service, was organized June 14, 1900. The fund of which the association has charge is made up of one per cent of all money received for municipal purposes from licenses, together with one per cent of the salaries of the firemen. The fund thus created amounts to nearly \$1,500 annually.

The question of creating the firemen's pension fund was brought before the city council Monday, March 12, 1900, when a petition signed by over 3,000 citizens, and asking that the fund be created as provided for in the charter of the city was presented to the council. It was then thought that the mayor could submit the proposition to the people at a special election without specific authority from the council, so the petition was referred to the chief executive.

It was learned, however, that the mayor could not call a special election without authority from the council, and on Monday, March 19, an ordinance was passed directing that a special election to vote on the proposition of the creation of the fund be held April 4, at the same time as the general municipal elections. The ordinance received the approval of Mayor Kirschner the day following its passage, and two days later the proclamation calling the election was issued. The proposition was ratified by the voters by an overwhelming majority.

The trustees of the fund held their first meeting June 14, 1900, in the office of City Counselor Culver, and organized. The board, membership of which is confined by statute to the officers of the fire department and city clerk, treasurer, counselor and comptroller, consisted of Fire Chief P. P. Kane, Assistant Chief J. O. Knapp, City Counselor R. E. Culver, Clerk J. J. Downey, Comptroller John F. Johnson and Treasurer W. A. Dolman. Chief Kane was unanimously elected president of the

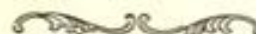

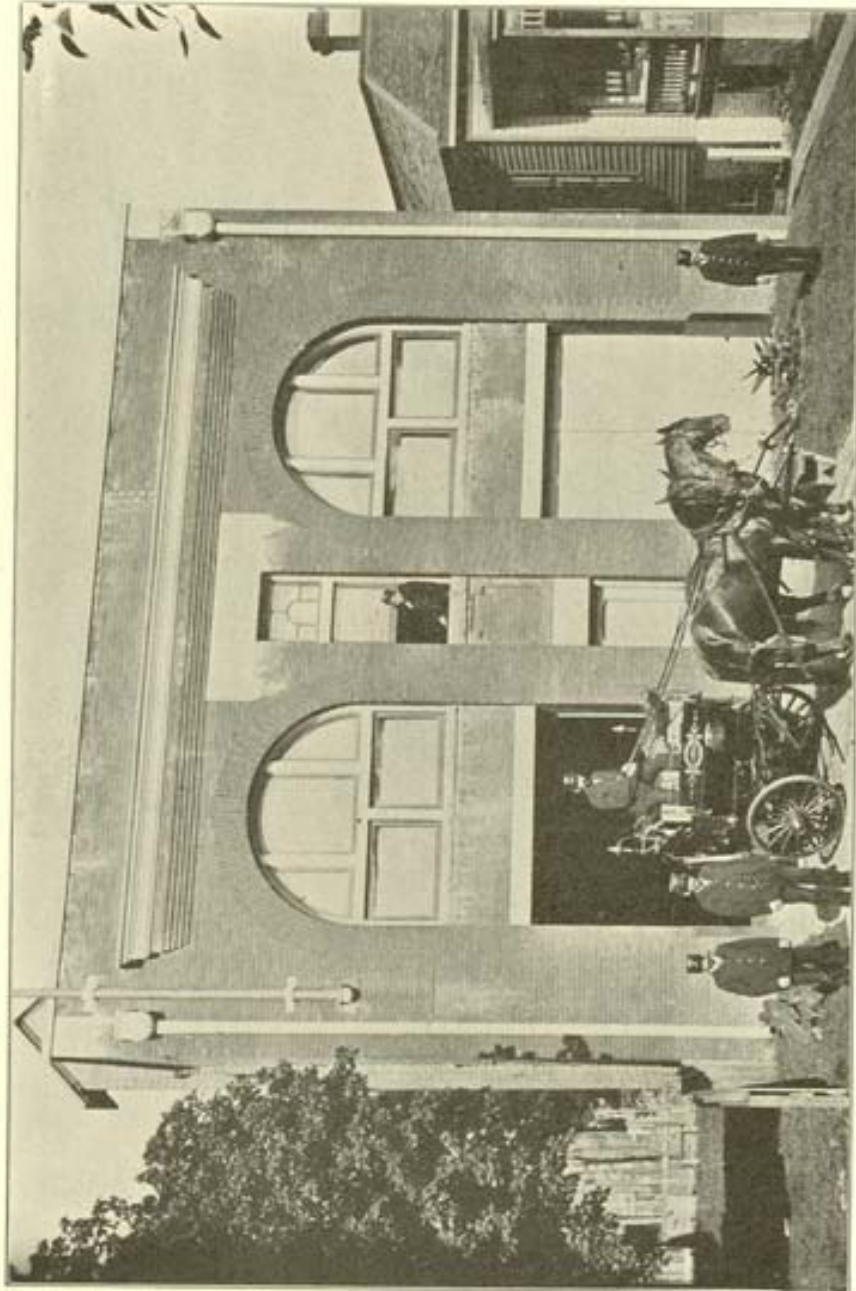

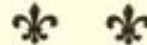

board, and Comptroller Johnson, secretary. The city Treasurer, under the statute, is treasurer of the fund. On Thursday, June 21, an ordinance was introduced in the city council providing for the method of maintaining the firemen's pension fund, and on the following Monday was passed, after having been amended by striking out some provisions which had met with opposition from several aldermen. The ordinance which directed that one per cent of all licenses collected by the city be set aside for the fund, was signed by Mayor Combe, June 27.

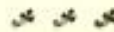
The trustees of the fund held their second meeting July 23, when it was decided that payments into the fund of money derived from licenses should begin June 27, the date of the approval of the ordinance. At the next meeting, held August 6, the treasurer reported \$84.05 received from this source, which, with \$36.70 derived from firemen's salaries, gave a total of \$120.75 to the credit of the fund. At this meeting the Missouri Valley Trust Company was selected as the depository of the fund. The president appointed the following standing committees: On ways and means, R. E. Culver, J. J. Downey and J. O. Knapp; on finance, John F. Johnson, W. A. Dolman and J. J. Downey; on relief, J. J. Downey, R. E. Culver and J. O. Knapp.

At the meeting of August 6, the board received the first application for relief from the fund. The application came from the widow of John Lewis, who died in the service of the fire department in 1894.

THE DEATH OF BLASS ARGUS.

Since the inception of the Fire Department, luckily there has been very few serious accidents. The only fatality occurred Sunday morning, January 23, 1870, at the burning of a row of buildings on the west side of Second street, near a bridge which then spanned Blacksnake Creek. All the inmates, with the exception of a young man, made their escape, and his body was afterwards recovered burned to a crisp.

When the firemen had finished, they were called back on the discovery of the remains of this victim; and while engaged in removing the debris, a wall fell, covering Frank Y. Heill, Arthur Colburn, Julius Sidekum, Blass Argus and Julius Gische. All were rescued and recovered with the exception of Blass Argus, a member of the hook and ladder company, who was so severely injured that he expired soon after his rescue.

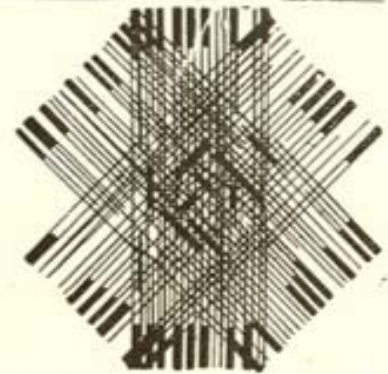

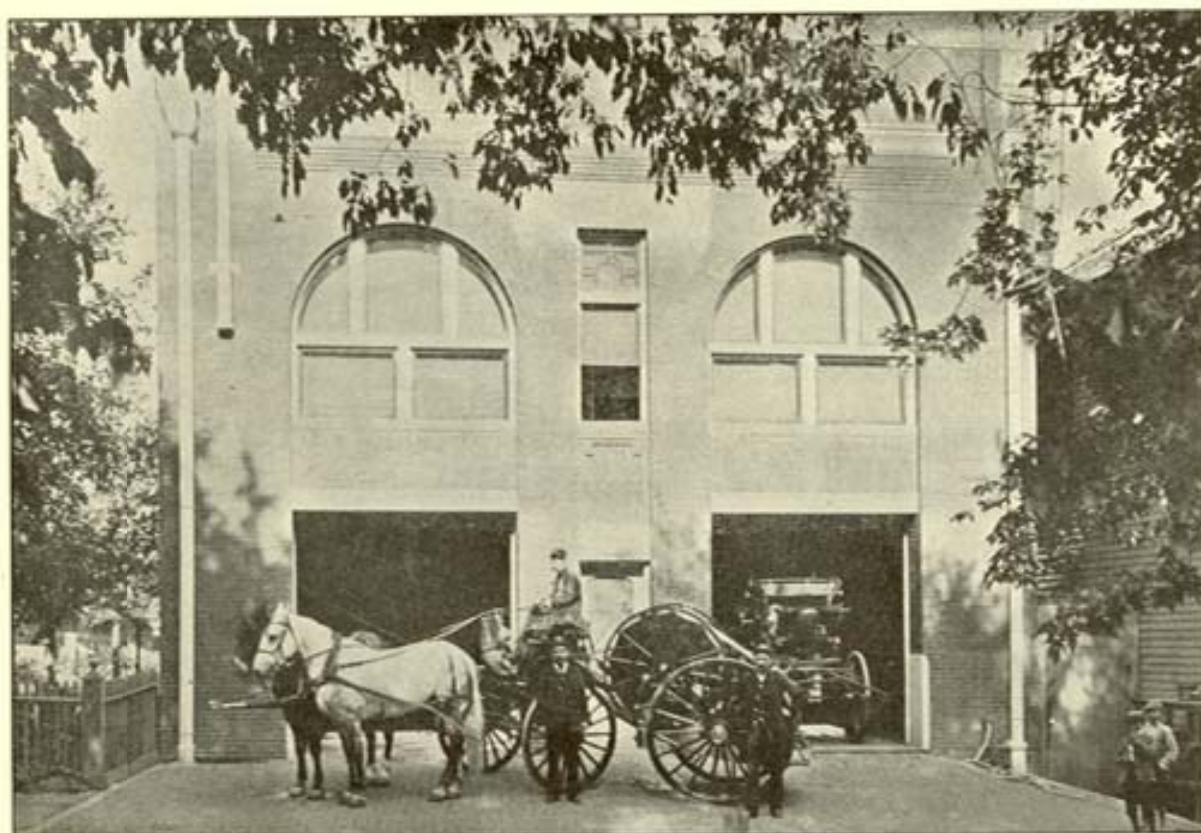

THE WATER SUPPLY.

During the early days of the history of the fire department it was compelled to depend for water upon cisterns located at various points in the business district. In 1879 the waterworks were built, being completed in January of the following year, when sixteen miles of mains, carrying 160 fire hydrants, had been laid, and the cisterns were then destroyed. The water plant, located on the bluffs north of the city, furnishes a gravity pressure for fire purposes under a static head of 350 feet, and renders the use of steamers by the fire department unnecessary except in rare instances. At the close of the fiscal year, ending April 17, 1900, there were 506 fire hydrants in the city.

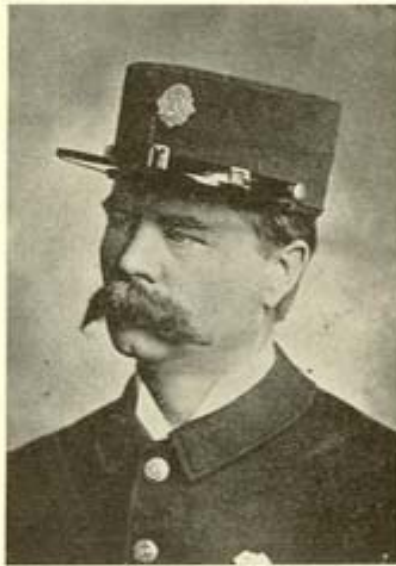

ST. JOSEPH'S GREATEST FIRE.

The Center Block and Commercial Block, at the corner of Sixth and Edmond streets, burned September 25, 1893, the Center Block being totally destroyed. It was occupied by The Townsend, Wyatt & Emery Dry Goods Company. North of the Center block, The Hoagland building, occupied by Regnier & Shoup Crockery Company, soon was a mass of flames. Soon this building and entire contents was a smouldering ruin. The Commercial block opposite and the Carby block on the east were also greatly damaged, the total loss aggregating over half a million dollars.

The fire started on the top floor of the Townsend, Wyatt & Emery Company's store, at about 9 o'clock in the morning, and spread with great rapidity. There was a strong wind and the entire business portion of the city was threatened. The department had responded promptly on receiving the alarm, but could make no apparent headway until late in the afternoon, when they succeeded in getting it under control.
